




Racial Distribution of Students (2006-07)



Residential Distribution of Students (2006-07)




Students' Attendance




Destination of Exit Students


Full Time / Part Time Studies (in September 2007)

The qualifications of the teachers are shown below:


38 teachers (69.1%) possess a Bachelor's degree

All English teachers have met the Language Proficiency Requirement. The Native English teacher is exempted from the exercise.




Teachers' Professional Development

The following activities were organized for our teachers' professional development:

- Mrs. Yau Kwong Tse Wai and Ms. Josephine Chung conducted a series of nine workshops named "Development of Language Across the Curriculum for English-medium Education" or DOLACEE in short for all teaching staff including the Principal. It was indeed our honour to have Mrs Bette Li, the Project Director from the Quality Assurance Division, and her assistants, Ms. Josephine Tao and Ms. Ida Moon, as our visiting officials to give support to the tutors and the teacher participants.
- A visit to Ma Tau Chung Government Primary School (Hung Hom Bay) was organized in the afternoon of the Second Staff Development Day for experience sharing.
- ➤ Sharing sessions were organized by our teaching staff to exchange views on implementation plans for the next academic year in the afternoon of the Third Staff Development Day.
- All middle managers attended a Workshop on Migration to "334" on 22 June 2007 to share their understanding of the reform and concerns with other schools and to explore the things to be implemented as leaders in the context of NSS school plan.

Besides the above workshops and activities, our teachers also attended training courses or seminars offered by the Education Bureau and other educational institutes.




Number of Continuing Professional Development (CPD) Hours Attained

In the HKCEE 2007, there were 59 students sitting the examination obtaining a total of 59 distinctions and credits. English Language and French were the best performing subjects, recording 3 distinctions and 19 credits and 5 distinctions and 9 credits respectively. There were 15 students with 5 or more subjects passed and 8 students achieving 14 points or more from the best 6 subjects. The best result went to NG CEN LILA CRISTINA (S.5A) with 2 distinctions and 4 credits.

Report of School Discipline 2006-2007

The School Discipline Committee consisted of 10 teachers and 52 students serving as School Prefects. A team of 5 teachers headed by a Discipline Teacher was responsible for handling latecomers. The major concerns of the discipline teachers were to develop students' self-discipline and sense of responsibility. The Committee handled matters relating to student discipline. Students understood clearly the requirements of the school, thus developing self-discipline. With incessant effort, the general discipline of the school has improved.

A rehabilitation programme, namely "The Phoenix Scheme", has been introduced since 2005 and the Scheme has been successful in encouraging misbehaved students to improve. Besides, the Discipline Committee also organized some commendation programmes to reinforce students' positive behaviour. The well-behaved students were awarded the "Most Well-behaved Students' award or "Most Improved-in-conduct Students" award. The Merit system and the Student Services Commendation Scheme were introduced as well to encourage students to participate actively in school and community service. All these programmes had a positive response and feedback from our students.

The School Discipline Committee is also very keen on developing students' leadership and sense of responsibility. To achieve this objective, a new Prefect team system has been introduced since September 2003. The system has been functioning effectively. Prefect leaders were given more responsibility and also power to manage the affair in their own team. Prefects are now more confident and responsible with good leadership. They are the role models of their fellow schoolmates. Training was given to them periodically.

Besides, the Discipline Committee also worked closely with the Guidance & Counselling Committee and the Health Education Committee to organise activities for students with the aim of guiding them to exercise self-discipline and assume their responsibility towards themselves and others. Report of Project Learning (2006 – 2007)

Project Learning is one of the Four Key Tasks as proposed in "Learning to learn" (2001). It aims at cultivating the generic skills, multiple intelligences and positive values among our students and providing students a chance to learn beyond the confines of classrooms. Project learning is a powerful learning and teaching strategy to promote self-directed, self-regulated and self-reflecting learning. It usually starts with challenging questions or problems, and involves students in working together or individual planning, reading and making decision over a period of time. It enables students to connect knowledge, skills, values, and attitudes and to construct knowledge through a variety of learning experiences.

More flexible modes of project learning have been implemented in this school year. Under the new arrangement, subject departments or cross-subjects arrange different projects for different levels of students. In order to facilitate the project learning and have good coordination of different departments to avoid setting too many projects in different subjects during the same period of time, Project Learning Coordination Committee (PLCC) has been established. As reflected by statistical figures collected through a survey with subject departments at the beginning of school year by PLCC, totally 15 departments have organized different projects for different levels of students. Among these 15 departments, 2 departments arrange cross-subject projects for the students. In addition, the school has allotted a total of \$7319 in support of project learning in this school year. This amount of money is mainly used for purchasing the necessary materials for the projects, gifts for the outstanding projects, and subsidizing the travelling expenses for field trips. The school has also allocated Rm. 605 for temporary storage of the outstanding projects for display on Learning Celebrations Day (8/3/2007). Furthermore, in order to reduce the workload of subject departments in organizing the projects, PLCC helps subject departments to prepare the certificates and to organize a prize presentation for the outstanding projects.

Based on the overall performance of students in the projects and the feedback of HODs, teachers and students, these more flexible modes of project learning are more effective and more efficient compared with whole school approach of Project Learning Week before.

5. Sub-committees

(i) Interest classes sub-committee

The interest classes sub-committee comprising four parents and one teacher convened to draft a table of activities for endorsement by the Executive Committee. The activities were all successfully conducted and enhanced home-school cooperation.

(ii) Lunch-box sub-committee

The lunch-box sub-committee was created to explore ways to improve the lunch-box catering service. Comprising nine parents and teachers, the sub-committee held several meetings and a tasting session (attended by approximately 50 parents, students and teachers) during which the lunch-box caterer, Lunch Republic, for the school year 2007-2008 was selected.

(iii) School uniform sub-committee

The school uniform sub-committee comprised four members who met to determine what kind of uniform would replace the existing girls' winter uniform. Samples were made up and evaluated by the Executive Committee. Feedback was conveyed to the teacher in charge of liaising with the school uniform suppliers. The new winter uniform for girls will be compulsory for all S1 girls in the school year 2007-2008 and optional for all other girls.
